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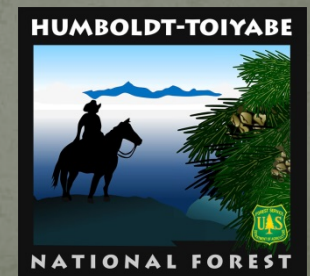

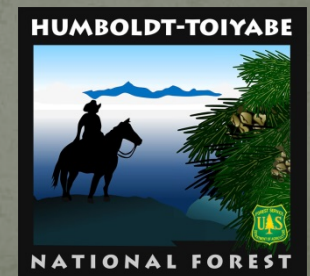
# Landscape treatments

- Objectives
  - Enhance forest and rangeland health –improve water quality/quantity, resilience to climate change, resistance to catastrophic fire and invasives
  - Maintain and enhance quality habitat for T&E, endemic, sensitive species
  - Partner with adjacent landowners to maximize effectiveness
  - Provide economic opportunities where feasible



# Landscape treatments

- Activities
  - Vegetation management for habitat improvement and fuels reduction
  - Rapid fire restoration
  - Road and trail maintenance
  - Riparian restoration
  - Managing permitted uses appropriately





# Landscape treatments

- Challenges and Opportunities
  - Funding – partnering is essential
  - NEPA / stakeholder support – partnering, public education and involvement is critical
  - Implementing treatments at a scale sufficient to make a difference – working together is critical to our success
  - Monitoring – partner with other agencies, academia and NGOs, use best science and adaptive management
